The sewer force main was fixed again behind Jack Killans house, but we installed a new air relief valve at the east plant. Hopefully this will fix the problem.

The Stanton Road project was completed including seed and hay at residents houses where new curbstops were installed.

The old 2 inch line on Stanton Road and Big Brook Road were cut, capped, and removed from service.

An old 2 inch hydrant was removed from Stanton Road.

The hydrants were all weed wacked in Indian Lake and Blue Mt.


A new 1 inch water service was put in for Bob Laverigne on Bennett Rd.



**GOVERNOR CUOMO ANNOUNCES FUNDING TO IMPROVE AND EXPAND
OUTDOOR RECREATION IN THE CENTRAL ADIRONDACKS**

*Upgrades to Lake Abanakee dam, expanded horseback riding facilities, and new trail to OK Slip
Falls build on region's tourism assets*

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced funding for multiple projects that will expand and improve outdoor recreational opportunities in the Adirondack Park – including \$750,000 to upgrade the Abanakee Dam on the Indian River, which was the site of yesterday's Adirondack Challenge. The 2nd Annual Adirondack Challenge was held in Indian Lake to highlight recreational opportunities and promote the region's tourism industry. Additionally, the Governor announced \$250,000 for the development of new equestrian facilities and trails in Essex and Hamilton Counties that will transform the region into a premier horseback riding destination, as well as the opening of a new hiking trail leading to OK Slip Falls in the Hudson Gorge Wilderness.

“The Adirondack Park is an unparalleled outdoor destination for New Yorkers and visitors, and also a major driver of tourism and economic activity for the surrounding communities,” Governor Cuomo said. “Yesterday we hosted the Adirondack Challenge to draw attention to all that the region has to offer, and today we’re going a step further by expanding and improving the facilities that help to draw travelers from around the globe. The Park’s lakes and forests are the perfect backdrop for hiking, paddling, horseback riding and so many other outdoor activities, and this funding will help local communities realize the full economic potential of these exceptional natural resources.”

The Adirondack Challenge drew hundreds of elected officials, business leaders and tourism industry representatives to the region for a day of outdoor activities designed to highlight the many opportunities available to travelers. As part of the Challenge, Governor Cuomo participated in a whitewater rafting race with Vermont Governor Peter Shumlin.

At the conclusion of the day’s events, Governor Cuomo hosted a Taste NY lunch reception and award ceremony to recognize the day’s participants. Upgrades to Lake Abanakee Dam

The Town of Indian Lake will receive \$750,000 to repair and upgrade the Lake Abanakee Dam on the Indian River, which will bring the dam into compliance with state dam safety regulations. The upgrade will also allow continued water releases from the dam for rafters who paddle down the Indian River into the Hudson River and through the picturesque Hudson Gorge. The rafting component of the Adirondack Challenge was held on this section of the Indian River.

Rafting is an exciting and popular activity for visitors to the area, and the rafting industry also provides economic benefits to residents and the Town of Indian Lake. The rafting industry depends on the water releases from Lake Abanakee to ensure the water levels needed to raft the Hudson River throughout the summer season.

Equestrian Network

The towns of Minerva, Newcomb and North Hudson in Essex County and Indian Lake and Long Lake in Hamilton County will receive a total of \$250,000 to develop horseback riding facilities in each of their communities. Among the projects being funded are:

- Five parking areas for horse trailers in each town;
- A pole barn with concrete floor and water;
- A 1,000 gallon holding tank for disposal of gray water and sewage from trailers;
- Two accessible mounting platforms; and
- A horse washing station.

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) is currently working to identify and designate horse trails in the Essex Chain Lakes Complex that surrounds the five towns. DEC has also proposed constructing a bridge over the Cedar River in the Town of Indian Lake that

would allow horses and their riders to access the Essex Chain Lakes Complex from the south.

"The beautiful lands and waters of the Adirondacks offer a range of recreation activities for people of all ages and abilities, and thanks to Governor Cuomo, we continue to create new opportunities for people to enjoy the outdoors," DEC Commissioner Joe Martens said. "This funding will allow local communities to attract visitors who will have additional opportunities to enjoy the outstanding scenery and breathtaking view in the Adirondacks."

The 19,200-acre Essex Chain Lakes Complex is part of the newest forest Preserve lands in the Adirondacks. Eighteen water bodies totaling 785 acres, ranging in size from the 3-acre Chub Pond to the 216-acre Third Lake are located in the Complex. The upper stretches of the Hudson River form its eastern boundary and the Cedar River passes through the southern portion of these lands.

Horseback riders will be able to enjoy views of some of the lakes, ponds and rivers, and also the nearby Vanderwhacker Mountain and Fishing Brook Mountain Range.

OK Slip Falls Trail

A trail to OK Slip Falls in the Hudson Gorge Wilderness officially opened to the public yesterday as part of the Adirondack Challenge. The three-mile hike leads to an overlook that provides a scenic view of the complete falls.

The parking area for the trailhead is located on the south side of Route 28, approximately 7.5 miles east of the community of Indian Lake. The trailhead itself is on the north side of Route 28, 0.2 miles west of the parking area. The trail also provides access to Ross, Whortleberry and Big Bad Luck Ponds. Approximately a half mile up the trail hikers should turn right onto the trail to OK Slip Falls. Follow the trail another 2.5 miles to the overlook on the east side of the OK Slip Gorge.

OK Slip Falls is considered one of the highest falls in the Adirondacks and its waters flow into the Hudson River near the center of the Hudson Gorge. The falls are located on the 2,780-acre OK Slip Falls Tract which the state purchased from The Nature Conservancy in 2013.

These projects build on Governor Cuomo's efforts to expand outdoor recreation activities to promote tourism and boost regional economies.

In August of 2012, Governor Cuomo announced a five-year agreement under which New York State would acquire 69,000 acres of land from The Nature Conservancy (TNC). The lands had been acquired by TNC as part 161,000-acre land sale by the former Finch Pruyn Company. As part of this, the State purchased most of the lands in the Essex Chain Complex in 2012 and the lands around the confluence of the Hudson and Indian Rivers in 2013.

Earlier this month Governor Cuomo announced that campers, paddlers and other outdoor recreation enthusiasts can now enjoy additional recreational opportunities in the Essex Chain Lakes Complex. Thirteen designated primitive tent sites along the shores of lakes and ponds in the area are available at no charge through a permit system administered by DEC and the Adirondack Ecological Center, and access improvements are providing increased hiking and paddling opportunities.

Town of Indian Lake Supervisor Brian Wells said, "A big thanks to Governor Cuomo. The Town of Indian Lake appreciates the governor's actions that will enable repairs be made to Lake Abanakee

Dam. This is critical not only for dam safety but to protect a key economic infrastructure in our town. We are also very enthused about the recreational opportunities. The governor's funding will help make these horseback riding facilities a reality. These funds are practical investments in our community that will help us capture new economic opportunity."

Town of North Hudson Supervisor Ron Moore said, "I and the whole Town of North Hudson are thrilled with this announcement and the possibilities this funding will have in promoting horseback riding in this region. We know there is interest. This will help not just North Hudson, but the five towns capture this recreational opportunity."

Town of Minerva Supervisor Steve McNally said, "What an exciting time for the five town area. Governor Cuomo has certainly been instrumental in helping the five towns with their goal of making our area a Class A destination. We appreciate the cooperation with the governor's office as well as with all the state agencies and look forward to moving forward together."

Town of Long Lake Supervisor Clark Seaman said, "That's fantastic. These funds will most certainly help develop the infrastructure we need to bring to reality a quality equestrian destination. It will bring a whole new group of recreational users and with that comes new economic benefits to our towns."

Town of Newcomb Deputy Supervisor Wes Miga said, "Thank you Governor Cuomo! This investment in equestrian recreation is a great opportunity to enhance economic development and put to good use a new recreational opportunity shared by the five towns. The governor's leadership makes this happen now; it would otherwise have been a long time coming. He's helping make things happen."

Neil Woodworth, Executive Director of the Adirondack Mountain Club, said, "The Adirondack Mountain Club is supportive of the five towns receiving \$250,000 in funding to develop equestrian facilities that will facilitate increased equestrian opportunities on the Forest Preserve within the five towns. "

John F. Sheehan, Director of Communications for the Adirondack Council, said, "We applaud Governor Cuomo for this investment in the communities around the Essex Chain Lakes and Upper Hudson River watershed. We look forward to its use in protecting the area's ecological integrity as the state works to enhance appropriate public recreational opportunities."

**INDEMNITY AGREEMENT: INVASIVE SPECIES CONTROL WORK
COMMERCIAL LAWN APPLICATION CONTRACT**

to as the "Owner") of property located in Indianhale, Hamilton County, New York, which
property has a street address of Town owned property [or other identifier]
(hereinafter referred to as the "Property").

Owner, in consideration of receiving assistance from the Adirondack Park Invasive Plant Program (APIPP) and The Adirondack Chapter of The Nature Conservancy (TNC) in controlling invasive species on the Property, hereby agrees as follows:

Owner agrees to the physical, chemical or biological removal of invasive species from the Property by the Adirondack Park Invasive Plant Program and The Nature Conservancy (including employees, contractors, volunteers), and releases from liability and agrees to hold harmless APIPP and TNC (including employees, contractors and volunteers) from and against any and all claims arising from these invasive species control activities on the Property, whether such activities involve the physical removal of invasive species from the Property, the use of chemical or biologic control activities, or any other activity that the Owner and APIPP/TNC mutually choose to employ on the Property.

Owner recognizes that there may be risks associated with all forms of invasive species control activities, and acknowledges that APIPP/TNC has made no representations, express or implied, about any such risks.

Invasive plant control measures using herbicides to treat Common Reed (*Phragmites australis*) will include two to three total applications of glyphosate: Accord (EPA Reg. No. 62719-324) or Aquamaster (EPA Reg. No. 524-343) via foliar spray and/or stem injection by Brendan Quirion, NYS Certified Commercial Pesticide applicator #C5863777; 8 Nature Way, Keene Valley, NY 12943 518-576-2082; NYSDEC Pesticide Business Registration #15356; or by other certified applicators, technicians, or apprentices under his supervision. The approximate date of application is July 20th to October 15th, 2013. If needed, there may be additional pesticide applications during those dates 2013 to 2018. The property owner or owner's agent may request the specific date or dates of the application(s) to be provided and, if so requested, the pesticide applicator or business must inform of the specific dates and include that date or dates in the contract. There will be no charge to the owner. There is no guarantee that the control work will be performed. Included with this contract is a list of the pesticides to be applied and any label warnings that are pertinent to the protection of humans, animals or the environment.

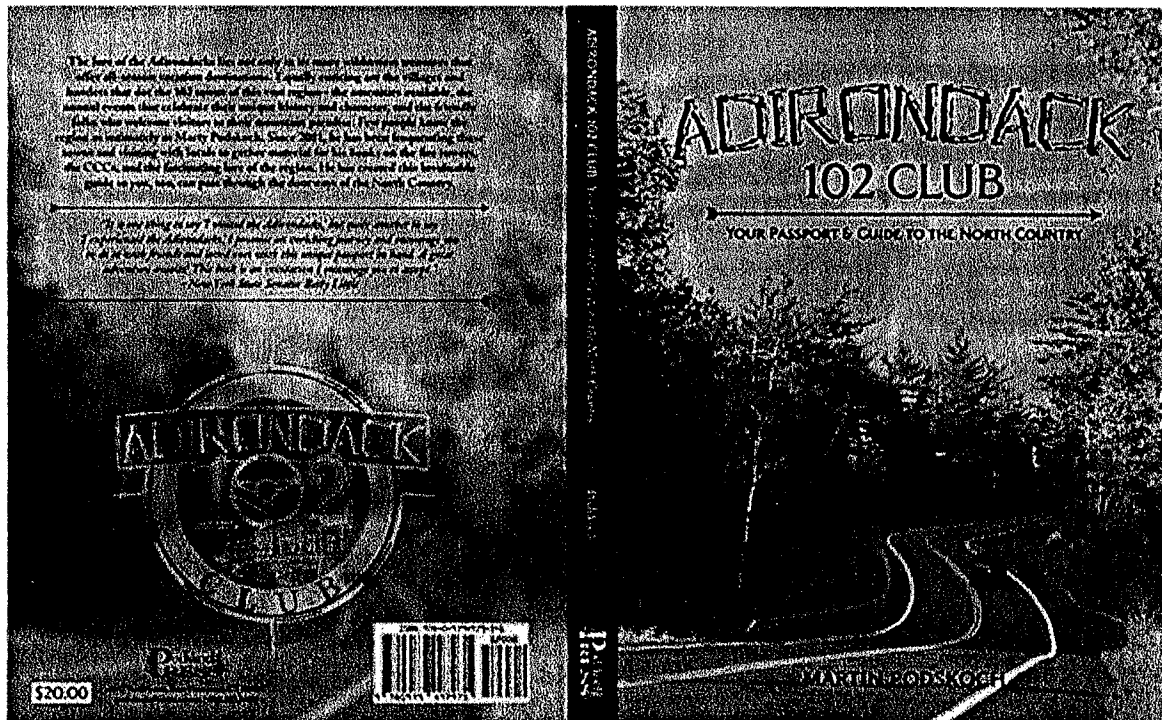

LESSEE: TOWN OF INDIAN LAKE, NY

MASTER LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT No. 3148723 with MERCEDES-BENZ FINANCIAL SERVICES USA LLC

At a duly called meeting of the governing body of Borrow held in accordance with all applicable legal requirements, including open meeting laws, on the 11 day of August, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF AN MASTER LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT NO. 3148723, AND RELATED INSTRUMENTS, AND DETERMINING OTHER MATTERS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH

WHEREAS, the governing body of TOWN OF INDIAN LAKE, NY ("LESSEE") has determined that a true and very real need exists for the Equipment (the "Equipment") described in the proposed MASTER LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT No. 3148723 (the "Agreement") by and between MERCEDES-BENZ FINANCIAL SERVICES USA LLC, as LESSOR, and LESSEE, as LESSEE, presented to this meeting; and

WHEREAS, LESSEE has taken the necessary steps, including those relating to any applicable legal bidding requirements, to arrange for the acquisition of the Equipment; and

WHEREAS, LESSEE reasonably anticipates that it and its subordinate units will not issue tax-exempt obligations in the face amount of more than \$10,000,000 during the current calendar year; and

WHEREAS, LESSEE proposes to enter into the Agreement with MERCEDES-BENZ FINANCIAL SERVICES USA LLC, a Delaware limited liability company substantially in the proposed form presented to this meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF LESSEE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It is hereby found and determined that the terms of the Agreement in the form presented to this meeting and incorporated in this resolution, are in the best interests of LESSEE for the acquisition of the Equipment.

Section 2. The Agreement is hereby approved. The _____ of LESSEE and any other officer of LESSEE who shall have power to execute contracts on behalf of LESSEE be, and each of them hereby is, authorized to execute, acknowledge and deliver the Agreement with any changes, insertions and omissions therein as may be approved by the officers who execute the Agreement, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by such execution and delivery of the Agreement. The _____ of LESSEE and any other officer of LESSEE who shall have power to do so be, and each of them hereby is, authorized to affix the official seal of LESSEE to the Agreement and attest the same.

Section 3. The proper officers of LESSEE be, and each of them hereby is, authorized and directed to execute and deliver any and all papers, instruments, opinions, certificates, affidavits and other documents and to do or cause to be done any and all other acts and things necessary or proper for carrying out this resolution and the Agreement.

Section 4. LESSEE hereby designates the Agreement as a "qualified tax-exempt obligation" within the meaning of Section 265(b)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

The undersigned further certifies that the above resolution has not been repealed or amended and remains in full force and effect and further certifies that the MASTER LEASE PURCHASE AGREEMENT No. 3148723 by and between MERCEDES-BENZ FINANCIAL SERVICES USA LLC, a Michigan limited liability company, as LESSOR, and LESSEE, as LESSEE, is the same as presented at said meeting of the governing body of LESSEE, excepting only such changes, insertions and omissions as shall have been approved by the officers who executed the same.

VETERANS' ACTIVITIES:

To salute veterans on Memorial Day, wreaths are placed at the 4 memorials in Indian Lake and Blue Mountain Lake.

American flags are placed on the graves of over 150 deceased veterans in 4 cemeteries located in Indian Lake and Blue Mountain Lake.

Donations are made to the National Wounded Warriors Foundation

Post members attend and pay tribute at wakes and funerals for all former veterans Following Flag Day Tributes, the Post invites school students to the Legion Hall for ice cream.

COMMUNITY SERVICE ACTIVITIES:

Post members collect and loan , free of charge, medical equipment and supplies to area residents.

These medical aids include canes, wheelchairs, commodes, crutches and walkers.

The Legion Hall is made available to community groups, organizations and families who need to accommodate a large group for funerals, weddings, birthdays and community functions.

The post has coordinated field trips for area residents to the following places: Sugar bush maple syrup making in Croghan;,109th Air Lift Wing, Schenectady; Slater Memorial, Albany; Remington Fire Arms, Illion; and Raquette Lake boat rides to name a few.

Each spring, Post members collect debris along a 2 mile section of Rt. 28/30 beginning at Cedar River Road and heading west toward Blue Mt. Lake.

Donations are made to the Indian Lake and Blue Mountain Lake Volunteer Fire Departments and to the Indian Lake Ambulance Corps.

Post members annually prepare and serve a hearty breakfast for Town employees as an appreciation for the services provided to the community as well as for maintenance of to the Post grounds and snow removal.

The post co-sponsors military band concerts in the town's Byron Park.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES:

The Post awards a scholarship to an Indian Lake High School male senior who has achieved the highest scholastic standing in his graduating class.

The Post adds to and or matches the annual Stewart's Shops Holiday Match donation which is distributed to local youth groups; Girl and Boy Scouts, Little League and Junior Hockey.

An high school junior of the Indian Lake Central School is introduced to how our government works by attending the American Legion sponsored Boy's State Program.

The Post contributed to the erection of the Indian Lake Little League ball field fence.
